This September we have seen our construction project progress from shovels in the dirt to holes in the wall and then some! So far we've:


- removed a window where the new main entrance will be

A special thank you again to our DAT (Dust Abatement Team) which meets each Saturday to be sure we all have a comfortable place to worship on Sunday!






#### The Wardens' Corner - Intentional Participation across the board.

Keith Birdsall and Burris Smith, our current wardens, have each used the *Wardens' Corner* to highlight important issues and encourage communication between the parishioners and leaders within our parish. This month, we hear from Paul Schaub, a former senior warden, and explore his thoughts on what it's like to have been on both sides of the fence. I had the opportunity to ask Paul some questions such as:

- What is it like being a "regular parishioner" after having been the Senior Warden?
- How and why do you stay involved in spite of your busy schedule?
- How do you recommend building good communication between the vestry and the parishioners?




Paul says "It's important to let go of your old role. It's tricky, too, not to interfere with the very business that you yourself were leading just a few years ago. But I find that it's also important to be available and supportive of the new vestry."

Paul explained that having been in a position of church leadership he understands the business side of the church and is better equipped to find the information he is looking for. For instance, when he leaves on vacation he's sure to pre-pay his pledge instead of doubling up when he comes home because he knows that the church has bills to pay whether he's there that week or not. And if he wants to know how the vestry voted on an issue he will read the minutes posted in the Community Room. "[But] the last several years St. John's has worked hard to make sure information is available in a way we can all find it. Emails, The Messenger, bulletins, cottage meetings, all of it is there. However, we are all individually responsible for seeking it out.

Individual responsibility was a theme in our conversation. When asked how he stayed involved in spite of his busy schedule Paul illustrated how he customizes his St. John's experience. "When I don't have the time to spend half a day at church I come to the 8:00 service. It's shorter and earlier so I can still get to work." He goes on to say "There are *plenty* of opportunities to make St. John's the church you want it to be. Outreach projects, participating as a worship leader ... attendance is the same way. If you don't like to see an empty pew, make sure you're there to fill it! No. The sky is *not* falling."

The next time you see Paul greeting at the door or manning the grill at a parish potluck take some time to get to know him better. As an administrator for Covenant Hospitals and someone who has served this parish in many ways we can all learn a lot about how to balance our commitments to work, church family, and self.

#### Christian Formation – Exploring Possibilities

Hi! My name is Sonni Magyar and I am a new member of St. John's. I came over with the "Calvary Crew" when our church closed its doors. It was a very difficult time for us, but the caring and support that we received from the members of St. John's has made such a huge difference.

The last 4 years of Calvary's ministry, I spent in study under the mentoring of Betty Kirkley and Marnie Bash of St. John's in Midland to become a catechist within our diocese. While that role was intended



to support our lives at Calvary, St. John's is now our home and I hope to find a way to use my strengths to support and grow with relationships at St. John's. I can't do it alone, though. Relationships are meant to be built together. I would like to start exploring the possibilities of what Christian Formation could mean at St. John's by asking what members see as needs and wants, what has worked before, and what hasn't. We can explore formation for adults and children. It won't happen overnight, but if we work together, it can happen.

Kathy Humpert, who taught Calvary's elementary age group for many years has offered to continue her ministry with children in teaching the gift of prayer with the little ones. On any given Sunday that she is in attendance, she and I will go down to the community room with the kids for children's prayers just before coffee hour. She teaches them how to pray about the things that are on their minds, issues they face at school, prayers for family and friends and how easy it is to do this anytime or anywhere they fell they need to. They learn to pray as a community. If you think your children would like to become part of this I invite them to join us after communion in the hall. Thank you, Kathy for you gifts.

#### Eucharistic Visitor / Minister Workshop

St. John's Episcopal Church Friday, October 29<sup>th</sup> 6:30 p.m.-8:30 p.m. Saturday, October 30<sup>th</sup>, 8:30 a.m.-4:00 p.m.

During the summer we had a meeting of people interested in the Eucharistic Visitor program. I was pleased to have a group of about ten people willing to explore this important ministry of our church. At that meeting we decided to look at how we can revitalize

this ministry, which includes reaching out on a regular basis to those people who are unable to worship with us each Sunday.

What exactly is a Eucharistic Visitor? It is a person who is trained and licensed to share communion with those unable to attend church services. Eucharistic Visitors (EVs), usually in groups

of two, are sent out by the congregation with bread and wine consecrated at the service. Through this home communion service the idea is to include the home-bound person in the communion which we share at our St. John's altar. A Eucharistic Visitor uses a pre-determined service from the Book of Common Prayer to administer the sacrament.

I have spoken with Anna Leigh Kubbe, the Arch-Deacon of our Diocese, who is very pleased that there are so many people from our church who are eager to explore this essential ministry. In order to train and license people from our church the diocese has offered to sponsor a **two-day workshop to be held at St. John's on Friday evening, October 29<sup>th</sup> from 6:30 p.m.-8:30 p.m. and continuing on Saturday, October 30<sup>th</sup> from 8:30 a.m.-4 p.m. Lunch will be provided for the Saturday session. The trainers for these sessions will be The Rev. Anna Leigh Kubbe and the Rev. Sherry Young, a deacon from the Blue Water Convocation. This workshop is open to all churches in our Convocation, so we will have the opportunity not only to learn about this vital ministry, but to share ideas with fellow Episcopalians from other churches throughout our Convocation....all this in our new space at St. John's!** 

There is a strong need for Eucharistic Visitors and we are looking forward to renewing our licenses so that we can continue to serve those from our parish who are no longer able to worship with us on a regular basis.

These two sessions will focus on the Eucharistic Visitor part of our ministry, although Anna Leigh and Sherry will also touch on the function of Eucharistic Ministers as well. The format for the training will be interactive with role playing and sharing handouts. To be covered during this workshop are topics such as:

• Theology of the Eucharist

• Practical suggestions of exactly how to practice this ministry

Pastoral concerns

Spiritual issues

• The use of prayer

This workshop promises to give us the background and practice that we need to be comfortable and effective when we carry out this important function as ministers of our church. If you are interested in participating in this workshop, please contact me on my cell phone (989-798-0229) and I will see that you get the necessary information.

I am looking forward to going through this training with all of you. Together we will learn to become even more effective Eucharistic Visitors and Ministers.


