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



Wardens' Corner: Moving Forward on Our Search for a Rector

Since the loss of our previous rector this past Spring, the search for our new rector has been, for many, a subject on the tips of our tongues. It is also the reason of our upcoming **Cottage Meetings** (*for dates and times see the next page*). As I prepared for my own participation in these meetings there was one woman who jumped to mind as someone I needed to consult. Ellen Redfield has served as a Warden at St. John's and has the added insight of having been the daughter of an Episcopal priest. She and I shared a conversation where I was able to ask:

- What insights to the church have you gained by having a priest as a father?
- How many times have you experienced a Rector turn-over?
- We have been described as "not a rector-dependant parish." What does this mean to you?
- As a former Warden what is your hope for the conversation in the upcoming Cottage Meetings?

Ellen explained that being the daughter of a priest gave her a more realistic expectation of what a priest or rector could be. **"We expect a Rector to be good at all aspects of the job. But they are just one person. Someone who is gifted at pastoral care may not be a terrific preacher and so on…"** She also reminded me that as her family moved from parish to parish having a ready-made community of support and affection was a real advantage.


As an adult, her church experience transitioned from changing parishes to changing priests. Ellen has seen a total of eight rector turn-over's in her lifetime and three have been at St. John's. She has observed that the way clergy move around has changed substantially. Before they used "the network" and went where they were needed via word of mouth. Today, it's a much a more formal and a more involved search process with a parish profile, internet advertising, and more.

When asked about St. John's being "not rector dependent" and what it means for our search, Ellen said, "To me, we've been empowered to take on the responsibility of the Ministry of the Baptized. We do need a priest and rector to lead worship and for many other things, but our focus is not totally on the priest. Our focus is on the Eucharist, and our relationship with God and each other. It's like the way music transcends the conductor and the orchestra. This is different from the way some of us grew up, but we are living into it." This can be seen in all aspects of our daily lives at St. John's.

Her hope for the critical Cottage Meetings is four fold:

- 1. That people **come** because the leadership needs their input!
- 2. We look forward and set aside thoughts of previous Rectors
- 3. We listen to each other and try to access the underlying force of the conversation.
- 4. **Think ahead...** what are we really looking for? What's important to us? Theology? Programs? Pastoral Care? Preaching? Come with some ideas ready to go!


