# WHO IS THE NEXT PRESIDING BISHOP?

## What is a Presiding Bishop?

In the Episcopal Church of the United States of America, the **Presiding Bishop** is the chief pastor of the national church. This person has the responsibility for initiating, developing and articulating policy and strategy, overseeing the administration of the national church staff and speaking for the church on issues of concern and interest. The role and importance of the office has grown over time. Originally, the Presiding Bishop was simply the senior diocesan bishop who presided over the House of Bishops. In 1919, the office was transformed into an elected one and in the 1940s the decision was made that the Presiding Bishop should resign any other jurisdictions for which he or she might have pastoral responsibility.

## Who is the Presiding Bishop now?

The Most Rev. Katharine Jefferts Schori has held the position since she was elected in 2006 and invested and seated as Presiding Bishop in a service at the National Cathedral in Washington, D.C. She is the first woman to hold the position. Her term as Presiding Bishop will end on November 1, 2015.

The Rt. Rev. Michael Curry, Bishop of North Carolina, became the Presiding Bishop Elect on June 27, 2015, during the General Convention. He will be the first person of African Ancestry to hold the position.

# STAINED GLASS WINDOWS

## A SHORT HISTORY OF ST. JOHN HEALING THE CRIPPLE ELLEN REDFIELD

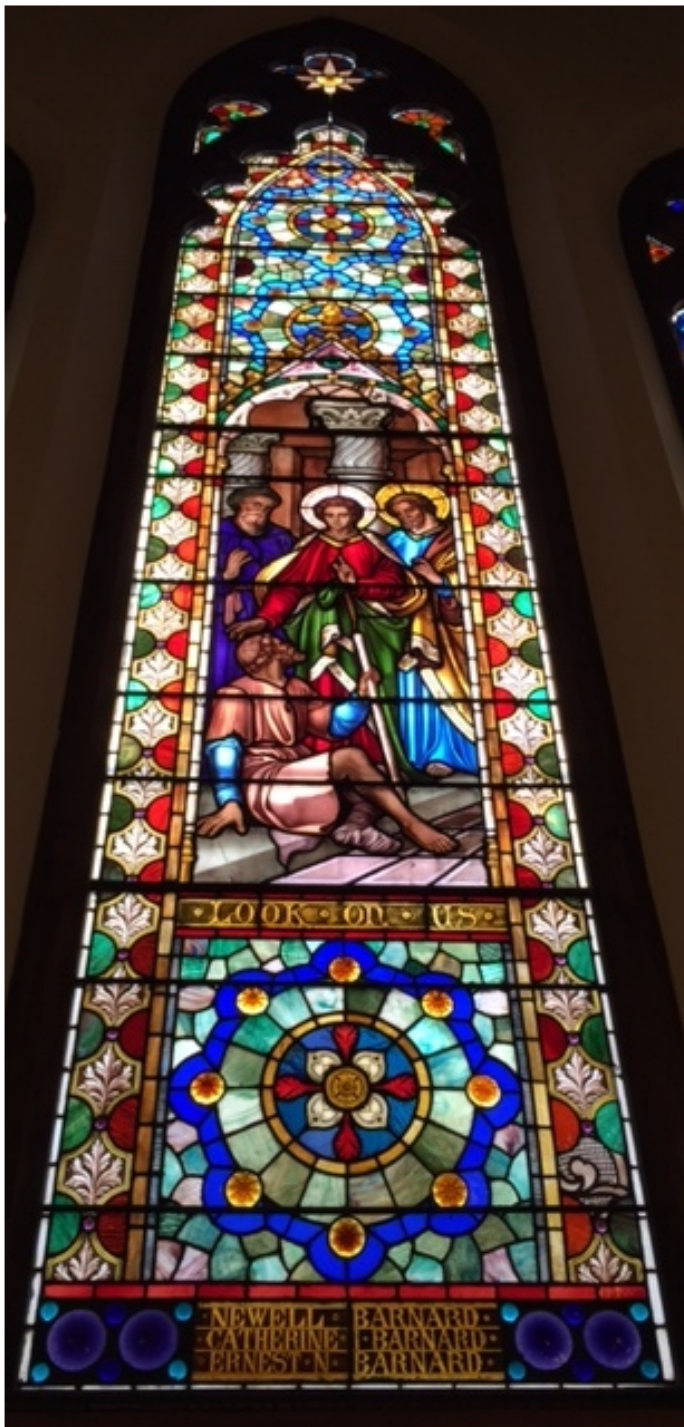
Before the chancel was switched around, generations of worshippers at St. John's were inspired by the beautiful stained glass window over the altar showing St. John healing the cripple at the gate of the temple. The story comes from the Book of Acts. The cripple is seated in the foreground, dressed in rags, with one leg bandaged. His hand is raised and his face shows amazement at the miracle he has been given. St. John is the main figure and St

Peter stands behind him. The memorial inscription reads: The Hon. Newell Barnard, his wife, Catherine, and their son, Ernest.

The Barnard family has a long history in Saginaw business and as members of St. John's. Newell Barnard served on the Vestry of St. John's in 1860 and in 1883. Newell was born in New Hampshire in 1825. The family came to Saginaw in the 1850's. Newell was involved in the lumber industry, was one of the organizers of Saginaw Salt Manufacturing Co. and was a director of the 1st National Bank of Saginaw. Barnard and Binder erected the iron front brick block located at the corner of Hamilton and Franklin (Hancock) known as the Barnard Block.

Newell Barnard also served his community as an assessor of Saginaw City and as a member of the Board of Supervisors for three years. He was among the organizers of the Saginaw Board of Trade. In 1882, Newell was elected to the State Legislature. He died at the age of fifty-eight after a brief illness.

Located now above the stairs as one enters the church from the Community Room, the Newell Barnard window is one of the largest and most significant of our windows. It is also the one most in need of repair. **A designated stained glass window fund has been established and contributions can be made at any time.** 4



# RECOMMENDED RELIGIOUS PODCASTS

If you are someone with an interest in news and cultural trends related to religion, audio podcasts are a simple way of keeping up. As with radio, podcasts have the advantage of allowing you to listen while doing other things. Podcasts can be set up to automatically download to your computer or smartphone for listening at your convenience. And in case you did not pay attention the first time around, you can replay the podcast as many times as you like. Best of all, these podcasts are free and usually carry no advertising.

While there are a large number of podcasts about religion, I recommend the following shows, which parishioners at St. John's may find of special interest.

*"Interfaith Voices"*

Maureen Fiedler, a Roman Catholic nun, hosts this show on "religious and ethical issues behind the headlines." *Interfaith Voices* deals with



both controversial and mainstream topics. Recent shows include why men are missing from pews, when God talks back to evangelicals and religion in the White House.

This weekly show is broadcast on National Public Radio and has conversations with invited guests on a wide range of topics related to spirituality and well being, such as aging, social change, shame and morality. At times the guests on the show are pedantic and lack focus, but if you are

looking for a more cerebral approach to spirituality, *On Being* is for you.

*"The Spirit of Things"*

This weekly radio program, produced by the Australian Broadcasting Company (the other ABC), deals mostly with Christianity topics, but includes other faiths. As expected, discussions make reference to the Australian context. Since the Anglican church is culturally prominent Down Under, the show frequently deals with its current state of affairs.

Many of the show's guests come from around the world. Most notable is recent interview with the American theologian Marcus Borg, who passed away in March 2015, shortly after his interview. Borg was famous for his membership in the Jesus Seminar group and for debating with N.T. Wright, an evangelical Anglican scholar.

*"Rhythm Divine"*

Another podcast from Australia, *Rhythm Divine* plays and discusses music created for religious practices. While there are many shows related to traditional hymns, other shows have conversations on diverse topics, such as Bob Dylan's gospel music, taizé and a Buddhist singing nun. *Rhythm Divine* is unique in its focus and worth listening to if you love church music.

The SSJE is an Episcopal religious order of men who post their weekly sermons for podcast downloading. The sermons run from 5-12 minutes with 3-4 sermons posted each week. The quality of these sermons is excellent and often surprising in their drama and humor. Of all the podcasts I listen to, this is by far my favorite.
