For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. When one has access to a church or chapel where the Sacrament is reserved, it is a good thing to make a point of stopping from time to time to pray in the presence of the Sacrament. God's presence fills the whole earth, and Jesus' promise to be with us always transcends even the grace of the Sacraments, but most of us find that a focus on the Blessed Sacrament may be a helpful reminder. Time spent in contemplation of the Presence will leave one more ready to recognize the hand of God in all places and the image of God in all people. Intercessory prayer, in particular, takes on a special light as we pray for the dispersed Body of Christ in his Church in the immediate presence of the concentrated Body of Christ in the Sacrament.
